## Our impact in 2019

Supported 2500 pregnant women to access lifesaving care All women who gave birth under our project delivered in a health facility 93% of pregnant women in the cohort made 4 or more ANC visits 770 women supported to access family planning services 4700 children reached with lifesaving immunization services 1500 women mobilized into "prosper together" saving groups 700 women supported to start income generating livelihoods 250 women linked to livelihood opportunities within their communities 270 young girls equipped with hands-on skills in crafts, bakery and hairdressing 2700 young girls reached with SRH information & services Recorded zero maternal mortality in the cohort

# Survival (MCH)

Our survival component aims to foster health & survival of women & children through ensuring that: (a) mothers and children are protected from infection and disease (b) mothers and children access essential health services. Our intervention work to promote proper health care seeking practices alongside health system strengthening to deliver for the most disadvantaged women, children & adolescents.

With funding from ZMQ development India, WHCUG in 2019 rolled out the ending preventable Maternal and New born deaths, improve health of adolescents through Integrated Mobile Channels for providing healthcare information and services project code name "MIRA channel" a mobile-phone based last-mile integrated solution that provides health information & communication to rural women and timely connects them to the health system for service delivery. The solution has in-built progress tracking tools including Pregnancy week-by-week tracker, ANC calculator, Immunization calculator, Postnatal & Newborn progress tracker and High-Risk Pregnancy Analyzer that provide critical data for managing MCH outcomes.

Evidence under the project affirms that when women have access to accurate health information during or after pregnancy, they seek care, deliver in health facilities and mortalities goes down. The project is continuously supporting VHTs to conduct weekly home visits involving phone enabled voicing of messages and submission of high-risk pregnancy reports and this is greatly paying off. No maternal mortality was recorded in 2019 in the cohort, facility deliveries stood at 100% & 4 or more ANC visits increased to 93%



"Being my first time, realizing I was pregnant pushed me into deep worries! Surely, I had no idea of what I needed to do to keep my pregnancy safe but when Hasifa, our area VHT registered me into Women Health Channel Uganda "ending preventable deaths project", my troubles were taken away. She began to visit me weekly and shared with me information about pregnancy, antenatal care and safe delivery and because of that information, I was able to deliver safely in a health Centre and I now take my baby for vaccination, Women Health Channel is surely my health and that of my baby. Hope, a first-time mother of Kainogoga Village"

#### Our results

- Fewer neonatal mortalities were recorded 5/1000 visa vi 27/1000 live birth national average
- Zero maternal mortality
- 770 women supported to access modern family planning methods
- 67% women had acquired birth preparedness item prior to labor

- 2500 pregnant supported to access care
- 4<sup>th</sup> ANC visits in the cohort stood at 93% far & above 60% national average
- 100% health facility deliveries
- PNC uptake in the cohort within the first two days after birth stood at 67% above 53% national average
- 4700 children reached with lifesaving immunization services.
- 67% women had acquired birth preparedness item prior to labor

ealth outcomes are worse for women, children nd adolescents who live in underserved commuties especially among the poorest and least eduited and in the remotest catchments. On the ther hand, women and households empowered meet basic needs look to the future with hope. hen women cannot earn enough to make ends eet every day, they are unable to meet costs volved in seeking care including ANC visits, preare for birth and give birth in health facilities, un ble to feed their families, un able to foot the cost care and raising their children. The goal of our relihood support interventions therefore is to npower resource constrained women & houseolds to find sustainable income streams to be le to finance their regular health, nutrition and re needs.

his year, Women Health Channel Uganda mobited 1350 mothers into "prosper together saving oups" of between 15-25 members (90% women 0% men). These meet on a compulsory weekly asis to save and borrow from group savings to art up IGAs, expand businesses, meet household eeds or finance health emergencies. Alongside wing and borrowing, initiated regular business baching for members of the groups purposely to imulate smart business practices. "I feel like I own the world, gaining financial literacy and creating my own business using savings and soft loans from my prosper together saving group, gave me an edge to controlling my own life."— Doreen age 17

#### ⇒ Our results

- ⇒ 1350 women mobilized into prosper together saving groups
- ⇒ 150 men mobilized into prosper together saving groups
- ⇒ 1500 members received financial literacy& business coaching
- ⇒ 250 women linked to livelihood opportunities within their communities
- ⇒ 700 women supported to set up profitable & sustainable income streams (IGAs)
- ⇒ 600 pregnant women used their saving to acquire birth prepared items

## **Adolescent Health**

Although adolescence appears to be a relatively healthy period of life, this population (24% of the national population) has a relatively high burden of disease (more than 33% of the disease burden). Almost 28% of maternal deaths in Uganda are attributed to young girls aged 15–24 years and 60% of premature deaths among adults are associated with behaviors or conditions that began or occurred during adolescence.

Overall, teenage birth rate in Uganda is alarming, 24% of girls give birth to their first child before turning 19 years. Every young person will one day have life-changing decisions to make about their sexual and reproductive health. Yet research shows that majority of adolescents struggle to access health services and information that would protect them or lack the knowledge required to make those decisions responsibly, leaving them vulnerable to coercion, sexually transmitted infections including HIV, school dropout, drugs & substance use, unintended pregnancy, un safe abortion and death.

Against that background, under our on-going "MIRA Channel" project VHTs & midwives are using enabled mobile phone devices to pass on lifesaving health information and communication to adolescent girls including but not limited to menstrual health, routine vaccinations such as human papillomavirus, hepatitis B, diphtheria-tetanus, rubella, measles. Healthy behavior promotion such as nutrition, physical activity, no tobacco, alcohol, drugs or substance use & HIV/AIDS communication.

Providing information, counselling and training to parents appropriate for managing behavioral disorders among adolescents. This all is working in combination to bring about expanded access to essential health services resulting into better health care seeking practices, adoption of safe health practices, delayed sexual debut, reduced HIV infections & teenage pregnancy outcomes for adolescents

#### **Outputs/outcomes**

- 2700 adolescent reached with accurate menstrual health information
- 1500 parents and caregivers reached with skills training for appropriate managing behavioral disorders in adolescents.
- 270 young girls equipped with self-employability handson skills in crafts, bakery and hairdressing



# Early Childhood Development



# Learning



Low education outcomes prevent children from gaining invaluable knowledge and skills to prepare them for healthy transition and successful futures. The goal of our ECD interventions is to increase access for the most disadvantaged children in the remotest catchment to Early Childhood Education & learning opportunities that is safe, stimulating and supportive of child development alongside increasing support within families and communities for children's learning while addressing the development and learning needs of children ages 0-8 years.



Our livelihood interventions complement in assisting families to have enough income flows to be able to pay for school expenses, ensure children are well-nourished & cared for. WHCUG runs a community strengthening model that position households, communities and schools as cornerstones for ensuring access and quality of ECD services. In 2019, we enabled 1200 children 0-8 years access ECD services, mobilized and supported communities to establish or refurbish ECD centers, supported ECD centers to access play and learning materials, trained ECD teachers/caregivers to offer quality pedagogical services, trained ECD management committees to efficiently run and spearhead Centre development initiatives, facilitated processes that worked to stimulate parents awareness, involvement and financial commitment towards ECD programs but also advocated for legislation of better ECD policies.

#### Our core outcome areas

- Improve quality of learning
- Improve quality of indoor & outdoor learning environment
- Children 0-6 prepared for successful transition to primary school.
- Address development and learning needs of children 0-8 years

#### Results

- 1200 children received ECD services in our centers
- 10 ECD centers supported to access play and learning materials
- 24 ECD teachers received training on improved delivery of pedagogical services but also received coaching on the revised ECD guidelines of ministry of education
- 65 ECD management committees trained to efficiently run and spearhead center development activities


